Why reinvent the wheel? We've all heard the expression before. I believe all nonprofits should be asking this question on a regular basis. Why ask? Nonprofits with mission statements can find themselves in a situation called "mission creep". Mission creep happens when an agency determines a need outside the scope of their true mission and acts upon it. For example, Hosanna provides housing and helps residents work towards independence. Independence might include job training, but that is outside the parameters of our mission. We do not have the expertise, staff, or experience to do job training well. What do we do? We don't try

to add a new service that would be subpar. We partner with Tennessee Department of Human Services and Siskin Community Rentry Services to help provide expertise in job training. Partnership with other agencies for resident needs has enabled us to maintain our focus and stay true to our mission. We have partnerships with the Chattanooga Housing Authority, The Hart Gallery, Chattanooga Area Brain Association, Chattanooga Parks and Recreation Therapeutic Recreation Department, and Signal Centers, to name just a few. Partnerships help us to expand our services and allow us to be good stewards of our resources. We are thankful for all our community partners and look forward to new collaborations. They make us stronger and help us remember why we are here.


