One strong lesson I feel will help one grow stronger in God is Jentezen's defining of the true application of Psalm 119:18. The verse, which is where the psalmist asked God to "open my eyes, that I may see wondrous things from Your law," implies that wonderful things might be all around, but our eyes are closed. We cannot see them. We need to pray and ask God to open our eyes.

If you are curious what you'll see when you ask God to open your eyes, you will likely have vision that will change your life forever. Jentezen pleads for us to think of the thieves dying at Jesus' side on the cross. One thief repeatedly looked at Jesus with blood spurting from His side, feet and hands. He saw his head crowned with thorns, and when he heard, "Father, forgive them," he cursed, laughed at, mocked the Savior. The second thief looked and saw the same blood, same cross and same painful cries. He begged Jesus, "Will You remember me when You enter Your Kingdom?"
